

Voice-over of the video 'A day at work with... Andrea'

Andrea: 'Hi, I'm Andrea and I work at Iberdrola. Today you're going to join me to see what my day is like. I'm walking to the office because I live really close by and so I can walk through this park, and look what a beautiful exhibition we have. This is the Iberdrola Tower. I work in the Offshore Operation and Maintenance department and for those of you who don't know, offshore is our offshore wind energy area. My desk is on the 31st floor. I was so dizzy the first day. You can see the Guggenheim and the San Mamés stadium'.

'I start the day with some meetings to organise the day with a really nice team. Now I log on to my English class with my South African teacher Teranda. I use English in 70% of my work, as all our projects are international. It's not all sitting in my chair so mid-morning I go downstairs with my colleagues to clear my head a bit. Today, coffee and Spanish potato omelette, very on brand for Bilbao'.

'When the coffee starts kicking in, I go back. I've always been amazed by the technology of these lifts, by the way. Now I'm working on the quality certification of East Anglia One, a huge offshore wind farm in the North Sea. It has 102 wind turbines providing clean energy to 630,000 British families. In a few weeks I'll have the opportunity to see it in person'.

'My stomach is starting to rumble, so I switch off and go down for lunch. On the menu we have salad and steak. I'm so hungry. The team is global, I'm connecting now with the United States, where we're developing the country's first large-scale commercial offshore park. It's time to go home. I have the rest of the afternoon left, so today I'm going to play paddle tennis'.

'And that was my day at Iberdrola. An opportunity I got thanks to the Graduate Programme that the company has to boost young talent, where you can move to other countries to keep growing.
